It is not sufficient to look up the names of and inquire into the records of the various candidates for the City Council and Board of Education on the morning or afternoon of January First 1926.

To use the ballot with highest effectiveness on that day, preparation to use it must have begun some time before. Do you belong to a Ratepayers' Association or any other civic organization which offers a forum for candidates to state their views, formulate their policies, and set forth their records? What have you done to insure that when election day comes there are names of those on the ballot for whom you can vote with pleasure and knowledge?

The inner pages contain a Chart showing the voting record of the City at the last civic election and previously. For obvious reasons, too numerous to explain, the percentages involve a certain amount of estimating, but this has been done on the same basis for many years and for comparative purposes may be regarded as quite adequate. Allowances have been made for duplications on the list.
