DIRECTOR'S REPORT

To the Council and Members:

It is a pleasure for me to offer this short summary of the Bureau's work in the past months and the plans that are under consideration for the future. To any but the least sensitive observer of metropolitan affairs in Toronto, it is clear that the Bureau's opportunity for assisting in the improvement of government and community life are very nearly unlimited. The demand for the types of work that the Bureau can undertake effectively is always greater than our capacity in terms of staff time and budget.

The following will show that our future programme contemplates on expansion of activities which might be described as community service functions, and a strengthening of our traditional research programme by tapping the rich research resources of the Toronto community.

I. Current Work

The Bulletin Series

There are a number of ways in which the Bureau works for more efficient municipal government and greater public understanding and knowledge of local affairs. Our library and reference facilities are in continual use and our staff assists a great variety of organizations and individuals in municipal matters. But our most important instrument for influencing community action is our bulletin series, Civic Affairs, which brings to over 600 key people in Metro Toronto objective studies of current local issues. Recently municipal business taxes, hospital construction financing in Metro, the distribution of welfare expenditures, and property tax exemptions have been the subject of individual studies. In the more

recent editions of the bulletin, an effort has been made to shorten the length and to present information in a less technical form to appeal to a broader audience of laymen, elected representatives, and administrators.

The next issue of Civic Affairs will not only deal with an interesting subject the characteristics of candidates for public office in Metropolitan Toronto but also will introduce a new format for Bureau publications. This lively new
design, including a new emblem, will be more attractive and also will have definite
practical advantages. Bulletins in the future will be more concise and more
easily read due to a new text layout featuring two columns a page and a shorter
over-all length. These features combined with a more attractive appearance will
help us in our competition for the time of our readers.

Seminar on the Metropolitan Community

During the past winter, the Bureau, in co-operation with the University of Toronto, sponsored a series of lectures on metropolitan life and government. The series brought together 86 senior representatives of key organizations - from business, labour, government, cultural and civic organizations in 16 weekly sessions on the University campus. Each session, conducted by an expert in a particular aspect of municipal government offered an opportunity to selected decision-makers from a cross section of the community to gain a wider understanding of urban life and a chance to exchange views and attitudes with others.

The very satisfactory response to this project reflects a growing concern on the part of many thoughtful people for the problems of urban life and government currently being felt in Metro Toronto. Whether this particular programme or a variation of it is offered next winter, experience has shown that similar types of projects fill a vital need and as such are important areas of activity for the Bureau.

II. Future Programme

Restatement of Aim

The work of the Bureau has traditionally centred on applied research emphasizing the analysis and improvement of conditions currently existing in municipal operation throughout Metro. It has taken the form of studies published as bulletins issued throughout the year. Recently, this basic programme was re-examined and it was decided that a more comprehensive and effective job could be done by -

- a) formally recognizing the need for a <u>Public Service Function</u> in our programme and officially adopting it; and
- b) exploiting the rich human and material resources for research in Metro to develop further our existing Applied Research Programme.

In practice, these functions would be developed in the following manner.

a) Public Service Function

The object of the Public Service Programme is -

- i) to inform the public about the operation of local authorities;
- ii) to provide them with critical analyses of current public issues;
- iii) to recommend the adoption of specific courses of action in relation to programmes and policies in the community;
- iv) to provide a clearing house function, collection of data relating to Metro Toronto.

These aims are to be achieved by means of a varied programme, the core of which will be the Bulletin Series revised as mentioned above. Courses, such as the present Seminar on the Metropolitan Community, conferences, assistance to citizen groups, and study sessions for elected representatives and private individuals would become a part of the Public Service Programme.

b) Applied Research Programme

The Applied Research Programme is the Bureau's primary contact with government policy-makers and, through the Bulletin Series, its primary means of influencing the adoption of improvements in government policy and structure. It is the action arm of the Bureau. The Applied Research Programme would have two major purposes -

- i) to carry suggestions for improvements in the operation of government and community life to elected representatives, public administrators, private civic leaders, and the general public;
- ii) to serve as a medium for public information that is to provide comment on current governmental problems and translate the results of basic research for the consumption of laymen and government officials.

It is proposed that a <u>Research Advisory Committee</u> be recruited to assist in research programming and the identification of key areas of public policy in Metro requiring intensive study. The Committee, composed of a dozen citizens, professional municipal administrators, and academics would also investigate the undertaking of larger scale research projects in relation to major problems in Metro Toronto.

The assistance of such a Committee and the potential commissioning of more extensive research projects than is possible under the existing applied research programme would strengthen our opportunities to improve present conditions of municipal operation. At the same time, it would exploit the experience of municipal specialists in public and private life who daily observe the operation of the unique form of urban government in Metropolitan Toronto.

International Meeting on Metropolitan Problems

For the past several months, the Bureau has explored the feasibility of there being held in Toronto in 1965 a meeting to discuss metropolitan life and government. These investigations have been carried out in response to a number of suggestions that Toronto, due to its unique metropolitan form of government, should initiate discussions of problems common to all major metropolitan areas.

Thus far, preliminary, informal discussions have been carried out locally and among key individuals and organizations abroad whose interests would be served by such a meeting. In addition, a committee has developed a tentative programme which would satisfy the objectives that could be expected for the project. All initial steps point to a firm decision regarding the active organization of such a meeting in Toronto being reached by mid summer.

The meeting would bring together participants representing interests in specific functional areas associated with the urban community from selected metropolitan areas. We envisage the attendance of people whose interests range from those of the urban geographer to public administrator, politician, economist and so forth. Each urban area would be represented by a team of such specialists.

The conference would be conducted at three levels with three basic objectives in mind.

- a) Functional specialists would be given an opportunity to exchange information with their opposites from other metropolitan areas.
- b) The implications are urban life, flowing from its social, economic, political, and institutional features, would be studied in terms of their effect on the management of the public sector of the metropolis.

c) Advantage would be taken of the presence of leading spokesmen from throughout the world to develop a concept of the place and future of the metropolis.

The initiative represented by the development of a metropolitan form of government in Toronto is known, has been studied, and is regarded as an imaginative innovation in governmental form throughout the world. Metro Toronto therefore could well be the rallying point for a study which would draw together goals, opinions as to how these goals might be achieved, standards, and effective social, physical, and governmental systems which will allow the finest metropolitan communities to be built. As a growing metropolis, Toronto would not only capitalize on the accumulated experience represented at the meeting but also could offer specialists from other metropolitan areas an opportunity to observe at first hand our form of urban government.

The feasibility of holding an important international meeting of this kind will be further explored by the Bureau in the coming months.

Membership

To conclude this summary of our work, I am pleased to report that more than 300 individuals, business firms, and institutions contributed to our programme this year. This support enabled us to distribute our publications without charge to 450 elected representatives of municipal governments in Metro Toronto, members of the Provincial Legislature and appointed officials of both levels of government.

In regard to our financial position, although expenses exceeded revenue by some \$2,300 during the past fiscal year, this is nevertheless a considerable improvement over the deficit that had been forecast at the beginning of the year.

Through the efforts of the Council, the Bureau was successful in gaining many new members as well as retaining the existing ones. The Council is confident that the membership roster will continue to grow in the coming year and the Bureau's financial position will also show improvement.
